National Village Gathering in Seattle Inspires Attendees

Village representatives were there to share ideas and to learn from each other and from the knowledgeable professionals who presented during the two and a half day conference.

The Village to Village Network, of which Bellingham At Home is a member, is a national peer-to-peer network formed to help establish and continuously improve management of member villages. Today, the VtoV Network has 190 villages delivering services and 185 more in development. Details are at the <u>Village to Village website</u>.

We came away from the conference inspired by the idea that this is a movement away from isolation and toward a culture that connects with neighbors, engages in local community and invests in creating sustainable living as we age. "Aging is ultimately a team sport" fit the spirit of the conference and the Village movement.

From established villages we were inundated with practical, tested suggestions for doing tasks like recruiting and vetting service providers and volunteers, managing member service requests and developing the web-based tools for running the organization. Our membership in the VtoV Network provides us with access to support to launch our organization and to keep it running in the future.

We learned of several Villages in the Pacific Northwest, some in operation and others, like us, still in development. Out of this connection grew the notion of a regional network to support each other to develop and grow.
